An intriguing continuation that left me wishing I'd started from the beginning.

The Light of Wounds is the third installment in a supernatural thriller series—and while the story itself is rich, descriptive, and steadily paced, I quickly realized it's not designed to be read as a standalone. There were moments that left me confused, such as Alex Scott's constantly changing hair colour, which I imagine would make more

sense with the context of the earlier books.

The characters are well-drawn and compelling, but again, I had the sense that I was arriving late to a party where everyone already knew each other. A few characters stood out enough to spark my curiosity, and I would've loved to understand their backstories more deeply. That said, Alex's internal struggles—particularly around addiction and the long shadow of past abuse—were sensitively and realistically portrayed. Initially, I found her a bit abrasive, but as layers of her trauma were revealed, I warmed to her and began to root for her.

There's a thread of dry humour that adds texture, and the slightly futuristic setting was both imaginative and entertaining. Just as the story really started to grip me, the ending came—and with it, a rather sharp cliffhanger that left me both frustrated and eager to see what happens next.

In short, this is a well-crafted and emotionally layered novel, but I'd strongly recommend starting from book one to fully appreciate the depth and world-building. This series clearly has a lot to offer—it just deserves to be experienced in the right order.
